## Chiefs Address: Bay Shore-Brightwaters Rescue Ambulance

Good Evening and Welcome to the 54th Annual Installation Dinner for the Bay Shore Brightwaters Rescue Ambulance. Please stand for the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by a moment of silence.

Winston Churchill said of volunteers, "We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give." I cannot think of a more truthful statement to open tonight's ceremony with. To the Membership, Officers and the Board of Directors of this great organization- Thank you for all of your hard work and dedication during this past year. Each one of us knows that there is no such thing as a "typical day" in the life of a volunteer. Besides the daily routines of work, home, school, as well as other activities, the members of BSBRA are always there to help the communities of Bay Shore and Brightwaters.

In 2012, our membership answered a total of 4001 alarms, most of the time, consisting of more than one call at a time. As a team, we were able to keep our mutual aide rate to a minimal 1.17%. In addition to getting calls out, our organization held multiple successful fund raisers, created and ran many educational outreach programs for our community and participated in a large number of town events. We held car washes, we worked with the local boy and girl scouts and covered multiple standbys. After a 5 year planning period, we welcomed home our beloved MCI Truck, Hercules. As always with any year, there were ups and there were downs, yet as an organization we faced each challenge head on.

One of the most significant challenges our organization has faced to date was Hurricane Sandy. Though out the duration of this storm of historic proportions, our membership left their homes, their families and relocated to a home away from home- "911 Aletta Place". Even in the face of danger, our dedicated volunteer and paid staff weathered the storm and overcame every obstacle thrown our way. Working hand in hand with the Bay Shore Fire Department, we were able to coordinate rescues from rising waters, remove down trees that hampered means of transportation, and facilitate various transports from local medical facilities. A new found appreciation for communication was found, as we did all off this without communication and without many of the daily resources that we have always taken for granted. Thankfully, a majority of our membership came away from the storm untouched by its horrific wrath, something that we are all thankful for.

As Long Island started the rebuilding process, A decision was made to donate our old 3-24-1 as well as our mini bus 3-24-85 to FEMA. Thanks to our own James Gilliland, we were able to change our plans and do something we all wanted to do from the start-- Help a local agency in need. After little debate, and a few phone calls, BSBRA was able to coordinate a donation with the City of Long Beach Fire Department.

One of the most humbling experiences of my life was delivering along side 4 of our members our mini bus to Long Beach. When we arrived, there was an Engine from Deer Park and standby crews from East Meadow and Levittown. Personnel came from as far away as Vermont to help in the rebuild of this beach front city. It was incredible to see the support of many agencies during this difficult time. During a conversation with the Commissioner and Chief of the Long Beach Fire Department, it was evident that their homes and businesses were affected. Their families had been displaced; their lives as well as the world they knew was turned upside down. But with all they had been through, they were thankful that they had their lives, and that their families were safe and out of danger. They were thankful for the little things such as our little mini-bus and strangers who step up to help. Our visit no matter how brief, left us with a profound message, With all that was bad in this world, all the suffering that we go through, and all of the opposition that we facehuman nature will prevail.

2012 was a year of challenge and change. However, with each hurdle, our department rose to the occasion. Our success was dependent on hard work, however we did not do it alone. Thank you to our neighboring ambulance districts of Exchange Ambulance of the Islip's, Central Islip Hauppauge Volunteer Ambulance, Brentwood Legion Ambulance, and of course Community Ambulance. A special Thank You to the Bay Shore Fire Department for your assistance, your support and your continued friendship to our agency. It is wonderful to work along side of such a group of talented individuals. Your continued support is essential to our success and we **Thank You** all that you do.

It is an honor for me to stand in front of you as the 28th Chief of Department. I look forward to another great year, and working with each hand every one of you. Enjoy tonight and stay safe.

### Presidents Address: Bay Shore-Brightwaters Rescue Ambulance

Good evening and welcome.

We have had another very good year here at our humble little ambulance corps and I am always moved when I witness your unswerving dedication to helping others. And to think that you are all volunteers.

I have always been interested in why people volunteer.

I am not talking about incidental volunteering, such as before or after a crisis. I wanted to understand about the long term volunteer, one that consistently gives time on a regular basis.

Why do people get involved as a volunteer in an organization? What is the motivation for people to take their time and talent to become involved? What does it take for volunteers to get involved and stay involved?

I am convinced that this understanding is critical to Bay Shore's survival as an organization. I believe the motivation to volunteer is internally generated. People do things for their own reasons, not ours, so our role here is to create an organizational culture that stimulates the inner motivation of each volunteer. What are we doing here that other struggling departments are not?

So after much contemplation and reflection, I have come up with the answer. Food. Food is what we use as stimulus to arouse that inner motivation. A well placed pizza, or hero, or fancy dinner, targets that internal motivation and scores a direct hit.

We feed you guys and you keep coming back.

All right, so it not only food.

I have seen that most people respond to three levels of motivation.

Basic Level: Self-serving drive

People often join an organization because it meets their needs. That need may be for friendship, for belonging, for business, or many other self-serving needs. It doesn't mean that they are selfish but quite the opposite. They are giving of their time and energy to fulfill that internal need.

Secondary Level: Relational drive

People also volunteer because of friendship. When a friend personally asks someone to volunteer, it is often hard to say, "No." If the friend is excited about a certain cause, he or she is the best person to do recruiting. Relational marketing is one of the most effective marketing tools.

Highest Level: Belief drive

The level of belief is the strongest level of commitment. When people volunteer because of their passion for a cause—they actually believe in the cause we have the strongest level of commitment. When people believe in the cause of the organization, even if that cause will cost them a great deal of personal sacrifice and pain, that is when the volunteer is highly motivated. People join and volunteer because they believe the cause is right. This is the highest level of motivation.

People often join an organization at level one (self serving) or level two (because of a friend), but in time they become true believers and passionate about the cause. This is our goal with each member of our organization.

A Volunteer EMT and a lawyer died and went up to the heavenly gates. Saint Peter tells the volunteer to wait a little while, and lets the lawyer in first. As the gates close on the volunteer, he sees the lawyer greeted with fanfare! Music erupts, cheers are had. A choir of angels descend from above, and sing of joyous hallelujah for the lawyer. Finally, the great Lord Himself makes himself present, and gives a personal greeting and warm welcome to the lawyer. Things begin to die down, and the lawyer wanders off to enjoy his eternity in heaven.



## PCR COMMITTEE

Hello All, There have been a few things that we have noticed while sorting though the mounds of calls that we have on a monthly basis. We are asking for your help in the following ways:

- 1) Please secure all important pieces of paper (ie: PCR and Tube placement forms, or RMA, or EKG strips) together with tape or staple in the upper left hand corner.
- 2) Please ensure that the run numbers are placed on ALL Sheets and strips.
- 3) Make sure that when leaving the hospitals, you have a signature on the back of the PCR. This is a required aspect of the continuity of patient care.
- 4) ALS PROVIDERS: please make a copy of your ET tube placement sheet, and put that with your PCR. Please make sure that the original is placed in the Chief's Mailbox so that it can be sent to county as per their requirement.

Should there be any questions, please contact us. We understand that there is a lot of paper work, and that we as an organization have lots of calls. It is imperative that we get this paper work in order for future use.



## BSBRA Builds an Innovative Special Ops Vehicle



In certain areas around the country, we sometimes see a duplication of fire services and EMS, not to mention competition—sometimes downright animosity—between the two. But among the negative relationships, there are positive examples of fire and EMS working together in innovative, productive ways. The Bay Shore/Brightwaters Rescue Ambulance (BSBRA) organization, located on Long Island, has found a way to provide and expand service to their community while continually working side by side with the Bay Shore Fire Department. A great example of this positive relationship is apparent in the latest addition to the BSBRA's fleet.

#### **Multiple Uses**

According to BSBRA Chief of Department Bill Froehlich, the organization first had the idea to design a special operations vehicle some 10 years ago. "We already provide BLS and ALS services to our community, but wanted to expand what we do," Froehlich says. "The basic concept was to have a vehicle with which we could respond to MCI and rehab incidents. We didn't want a heavy-rescue vehicle, because that would infringe upon what the local fire department was responsible for." The idea took a backburner until BSBRA Assistant Chief Gerald Guszack started working on the concept with earnest.

"We had operated with an older ambulance and a van for a long time" Guszack says. "We really needed more space for our equipment. We also wanted the vehicle to have 4 x 4 capabilities because we had some areas in our district that were not accessible with our available vehicles." Guszack also specced the vehicle with a front-mounted winch, a light tower, a heat and A/C unit large enough to power a 15' x 30' tent, a microwave, a refrigerator, life preservers and BLS and ALS medical equipment. "Initially we looked around locally and nationally at what other EMS organizations were using," Guszack says. "Using the Internet also helped in our search for a manufacturer to build the vehicle or our choice." And this was no simple build—the BSBRA wanted the vehicle to be able to respond to mass-casualty incidents (MCIs), large fires, rehab, triage, wildfires, hurricanes and any other major disaster locally and even in a mutual-aid capacity throughout Islip, Suffolk and Nassau counties, and the five boroughs of New York City.

#### **Working Together**

Before the BSBRA purchased the vehicle, it met with the chiefs of the Bay Shore Fire Department. "We discussed what we wanted to accomplish with the response of the vehicle," Froehlich says. "Normally we have two ambulances respond to every fire scene, so this would be an additional option should the vehicle be needed. We explained that we weren't trying to step on anyone's toes and that we would like to work with them at all emergency scenes. They welcomed the idea 100%, which took a great deal of stress off of us."

Like most organizations, the BSBRA went out for competitive bidding. "We received quotes from three manufacturers," Froehlich says. "Great Lakes Specialty Vehicles represented Custom Fab & Body of Marion, Wis. We felt that Custom Fab was good for us, simply based on the fact that their company had built similar vehicles for other agencies nationwide." Custom Fab also gave the BSBRA a great price. "Since we didn't have grant money, this helped us out a great deal," Froehlich says. "Our budget comes from a special ambulance district tax, so price was important for us going forward with the purchase."

Representatives from the BSBRA traveled to Custom Fab on at least four occasions to meet with engineers and oversee the build process. "They offered suggestions on what would or wouldn't work, as well as being receptive to our ideas and implementing most of them," Froehlich says. "The vehicle was delivered in record time and has worked out well for us. It came just in time for Hurricane Sandy." The BSBRA fondly calls it Hercules.

#### **Get Creative**

The BSBRA was proactive in their thinking. They planned for this purchase more than 10 years ago and designed the vehicle to not only help them expand their service to the community, but also to help the local fire department and other organizations through mutual aid. Preplanning in advance for your response district's needs should be your first priority in any vehicle purchase. Also take into consideration budget constraints, and how the vehicle will respond and be used. In today's poor economy, sharing equipment among agencies and working together is a great concept—one that should be expanded upon all over the country.

#### Sidebar: A Closer Look

The Bay Shore/Brightwaters Rescue Ambulance's new rescue vehicle is built on a 2009 Chevrolet C5500 Kodiak crew cab chassis with Duramax diesel engine and Allison automatic transmission. The OEM front bumper was removed and replaced with a Buckstop bumper that houses a recessed-mounted Warn 16,000-lb. winch. The truck is equipped with an Onan 20-kW Protect PTO generator that powers a Will-Burt NS4.5-9000(OPT) 9000-watt light mast and two Hannay electric rewind cable reels with 200 feet of 8/3 cable. The body is a 13' all-aluminum walk-around rescue-style body equipped with ROM aluminum roll-up doors. The body top features two coffin compartments, one on each side of the body with a center walkway. These compartments are equipped with multiple adjustable shelves and slide-out trays, including a dual direction tray. The apparatus is equipped with a Whelen M Series Super LED warning-light package and Whelen Pioneer LED scene lights in multiple locations.

#### Sidebar: More about BSBRA

The Bay Shore/Brightwaters Rescue Ambulance operates with five ambulances:

-2005 PL Custom -Two 2003 PL Custom -1998 PL Custom -2009 Braun

All five vehicles are built on Ford F-350 chassis. The organization also operates several fly cars and a paramedic ALS vehicle that carries narcotics, telemetry and defibrillators. The organization is staffed by 150 volunteer members and four paid members who work 6 a.m. – 6 p.m., with duty crews covering the remainder. The response district covers eight square miles, with light industrial, restaurants, strip shopping centers, apartment complexes and a large waterfront area. During Hurricane Sandy, the company responded to an average of 25 runs per day for a total of 238 calls from Sunday through Wednesday of that week; 25 members were on duty during the week.


